Goals for this Webinar

Districts/Clubs have Disaster Preparedness Goals

- 1. Zone/Regions/Districts have a disaster management strategy
- Every Rotary/Rotaract club has a Disaster Plan & committee/chair
- 3. District Disaster Preparedness Committee assist & support Clubs
- 4. Create Club plans & individual/family plans
- 5. Districts develop standard methodology for responding to disasters



Zone/Region Disaster Management Strategy & Suggested Approach

- I. Zone/Region/District Committee with Executive Oversight Responsibility for disasters
- II. Sub-Committees with separate focus, chairs, composition & responsibilities
 - A. Preparedness sub-committee
 - **B.** Recovery sub-committee
- III. Notes & Considerations for a Regional Disaster Management approach-
 - A. Geographical boundaries in common
 - B. Common Institutional capacity
 - C. Resources shared information critical for cooperation, fiscal transparency, publicity (see DNA-RAG website)
 - D.Role of DNA-RAG
- IV. Draft strategy based on Rotary disaster region with similar risk profiles (e.g. Caribbean)



Disaster Preparedness for Rotary & Rotaract Clubs



"Prepare before the storm!"

The best way to RESPOND to a DISASTER is to have a PLAN!







Disaster Planning for Clubs

- Identify & assess risks
- II. Prepare club plans
- III. Identify contact approach within clubs
- IV. Create liaison with local emergency responders & invite to club meetings – before hand
- v. Identify club resources
- vi. Encourage Rotarians & Rotaractors to create individual/family plans
- VII. Conduct simulations/test exercises of how club would act



Assessing Your Risks

- What are YOUR risks?
 - Tornadoes
 - Hurricanes/Cyclones
 - Volcanoes
 - Earthquakes
 - Pandemics (Covid etc)
 - Heavy rains, floods & mud slides
 - Heat stress
 - Wildfires
 - Sea level rise
 - Industrial accidents
 - Personal at home risks
 - Other risks

UN IPCCC advised (2021) that

"Climate related disasters will

increase multifold by 2030"!



Disaster Preparedness Planning

Rotarians are **PEOPLE PREPARING** to take **ACTION**

- > Actions BEFORE disaster (focus of this webinar)
- > Actions **DURING** a disaster (future webinar)
- > Actions AFTER a disaster (future webinar)

Rotary has a long and impactful history of helping in disasters



Rotary ACTIONS BEFORE a disaster

- Organized & committed Zone/District w senior leadership
- District Disaster Funds (part of club's district dues?)
- Regional disaster focus Zone/Region wide (eg. Caribbean)
- District Disaster Preparedness Committees
 - facilitating Club & Individual Disaster plans
- Partners RI, DNA-RAG & non-Rotary partners
- Create Library of Disaster Preparedness Resources



Rotary ACTIONS DURING a disaster

- Convening disaster specific committee/meetings ASAP
- Establishing & maintaining contact with Clubs on the ground & club/regional coordinators
- Disseminating disaster info to Rotary & external parties
- Activating Fund Raising promptly
- · Assisting in channeling help through local clubs in need
- Record keeping contacts, pledges of assistance & maintaining contact, projects (APP/shared database)



Rotary ACTIONS AFTER a disaster

- Continuing response actions as needed
- Devising efforts to help clubs with resources
- Maintaining a helpful, encouraging, responsive & accountable system for community specific recovery projects
- Moving supplies (pre-positioned or otherwise) to disaster hit areas
- Channeling financial help to clubs
- Ensuring appropriate projects w stewardship & reporting
- Noting 'learning points' to aid response to future disasters
- Long-term psychological impact on victims and rescue/relief workers

- Club decides to seek district support
- Funding request submitted into APP
- Project Review
- Committee Review & Approval
- Project Funding provided
- Ensure record keeping
- Executing plans
- Compiling information on actions
- Stewardship Reporting

- Project Close Out
- Post-Project Evaluation
- Final stewardship reports
- Meets Community Needs
- Sustainable
- On-Time
- Within Budget
- Stewardship & Transparency
